EDUCATION

We improve the environment through local chapters and hands-on education.

In 2024, Wild Ones advanced its educational mission, enhancing understanding and engagement with native plants and ecosystems through various programs and platforms. These numbers reflect more than growth - they reflect a movement that's opening its doors to more people and expanding its reach with intention and care.

Program Highlights

- Dedicated **over 24,800 volunteer hours** to organize educational activities, achieving an **107% increase in event attendance** from the previous year.
- Accessibility was a clear priority with 74% of events open to the public, 31% designed with families in mind, and a fourfold increase in events offered in multiple languages.
- Chapters organized **over 1,900 programs and activities** ranging from workshops and garden tours to plant rescues and public lectures.

National Education Programs

- The Lorrie Otto Seeds for Education Grant program awarded \$10,000 in funding to 23 youth-serving projects across 15 states.
- The 37th volume of the Wild Ones Journal with **39 original educational articles** offered in-depth insights and practical resources on native plants and natural landscaping.
- Expanded digital outreach through the Wild Ones YouTube channel and blog - featuring webinars and "Meet the Designer" videos garnered over 65,000 views.





ADVOCACY

A healthy planet starts with native plants.

In 2024, Wild Ones chapters championed environmental advocacy at the HOA, city, and state levels. Their collective efforts shaped local legislation, improved HOA practices, and heightened public awareness of native landscaping. Advocacy matters now more than ever as communities confront biodiversity loss, climate change, and invasive species amid growing political division around environmental issues. Wild Ones offers a different path forward: non-partisan, community-driven action. Our members unite around native plants, transforming shared values into tangible local change. Knowing that effective advocacy begins at the grassroots, we are proud to share the following community-led successes.

Legislative Achievements

- **Twenty-seven chapters** reported engaging in lobbying and advocacy efforts at the HOA, city, and state levels.
- **Fifteen chapters** successfully shaped public policy, influenced local codes, and preserved natural spaces in their communities.

Community Engagement

- The **Arrowhead Chapter** partnered with Shoreview Natives to demonstrate how native plant installations enhance both aesthetics and ecological health.
- The **Dayton Area Chapter** teamed up with Native Ohio Plants Nursery and Deeply Rooted Landscapes to promote prairie restoration, tree planting, and sustainable garden design.
- The **Gibson Woods Chapter** collaborated with Possibility Place Nursery to underscore the importance of plant diversity in the marketplace.





COLLABORATION

Connecting people and native plants for a healthy planet.

Education and advocacy are two halves of the same leaf, powering grassroots change and helping Wild Ones cultivate a future where native plants and natural landscapes flourish in every community. Yet no leaf grows alone: **collaboration is the stem that supports our chapters**, unites partners, and elevates our collective work. In 2024, this commitment to partnership and cooperative action dramatically expanded the reach and impact of our mission.

Strategic Partnerships

- Chapters collaborated with local nurseries, landscapers, and native plant advocates—contributing **over \$25,000 to advance initiatives** that align with our mission.
- Actively engaged with **over 1,000 mission-aligned organizations**.

Community Projects

- **356 new connections** with conservation, cultural and humanitarian organizations.
- Garden and restoration projects resulted in over 777,000 square feet of native plantings and over 197,000 square feet of turf removed.

Outreach and Engagement

 Collaborative efforts yielded a diverse slate of public garden projects, as chapters invested more than 6,462 volunteer hours and led 431 public outreach events at farmers markets, festivals, fairs, home-and-garden shows, tours, and public libraries.



MILESTONES

Chapter Recognition

Ann Arbor Chapter was honored with the 2024 Excellence in Water Quality Award by the Washtenaw County Water Resources Commissioner's Office.

Dayton Area Chapter was recognized by the Wright Memorial Public Library for their help with the installation of a native garden.

Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants Special Event Highlight

On March 19, 2024, Wild Ones co-hosted a special program featuring ecologist and bestselling author Robin Wall Kimmerer. The event, Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings. of Plants, garnered over 400 in-person attendees and over 2,700 individuals joined via live stream. This event was made possible through the collaboration of Wild Ones, the UW Oshkosh Sustainability Institute, the Inter-Tribal Student Council, the Indigenous Studies Program, and the Wild Ones Fox Valley Area Chapter.

GRASSROOTS

A knowledgeable, hands-on, and supportive community.

Wild Ones is a grassroots organization offering hands-on education through. the work of our local chapters. We are a movement of people who are passionate about our mission and inspire others to improve the environment with native plants.

Grassroots Community

- Over **790 members served in leadership roles**, coordinating the efforts of **2,400 volunteers** across **129 chapters**.
- Chapters increased outreach activities with 85% participating in public events and connecting with nearly 300,000 people.

Wild Ones Growth

- Welcomed more than 4,950 new members including over 400 who joined through emerging seedling chapters.
- Membership **grew by 25%** to over 12,043 individuals, businesses, and affiliates in 2024 we are now **over 12,000 members strong**!

Youth Engagement Initiatives

• Chapters collaborated with over **35 youth organizations** to educate and involve young people in native plant initiatives.

States with the most growth include Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, New York, and Ohio

Chapters with the most growth are Front Range (CO), Western Pennsylvania Area (PA), Greater Cleveland (OH), St. Louis (MO), and West Cook (IL)



IMPACT

Native plants & natural landscapes thriving in every community.

Native habitat projects embody Wild Ones mission. In 2024, chapters supported **over 320 public native plant gardens and habitat projects**.


Habitat Transformation

- Nearly 777,000 square feet turned into native plant habitats and 197,000 square feet of turf removed.
- Chapters propagated **over 7,500 milkweed** (Asclepias spp.) plugs and collected **over 23 lbs. of milkweed seeds** to support monarch populations.

Native Plants in the Ground

- Almost 12,000 native plants were donated by chapters to public projects.
- Chapters **distributed more than 167,000 native plants** through native seed and plant sales, shares, and exchanges, significantly contributing to the supply of plants for projects across Wild Ones' reach.


Wild Ones' support for seed libraries is growing! The Southern Kentucky

REVENUE \$1,602,771



SUMMARY

In 2024, Wild Ones advanced its mission through robust education, advocacy, and community engagement. Supported by more than 24,800 volunteer hours, attendance at our educational events surged by 107%. Collaborative efforts forged over 350 new partnerships, supplied nearly 12,000 donated native plants for habitat-restoration projects, and distributed more than 167,000 additional plants and seeds through sales and sharing events. Membership surpassed 12,000, reflecting a growing commitment to environmental stewardship.
